Roof cost grows

We've known for years that a new roof was in our future. We've patched and prayed and borrowed time, but finally, after 28 years in our building, the time has come!

The finance committee chose the lowest estimate, but it turned out the bidder didn't include the tall sanctuary roof in his bid! Adding it more than doubled the cost.

Then, when the workers began tearing off the old roof from the sanctuary part, they found that the work had not been done to code originally. (The roofing material was put right over insulation without a layer of wood over the foam.) In order for the guarantee to be good, they would have to add sheathing. All of this means our new roof will cost at least \$77,000 (with the roofing material being guaranteed 50 years).

In other words, if our expenditure on comforts, luxuries, amusements, etc. is up to the standard common among those with the same income as our own, we are probably giving away too little.

"If our charities do not at all pinch or hamper us, I should say they are too small. There ought to be things we should like to do and cannot do because our charitable expenditures exclude them."

Ouch! I came across the above quote from C. S. Lewis (British novelist and lay theologian) when I was looking for something inspiring to say about our Toledo First Church finances. I'm not sure how many agreed with Mr. Lewis in his day or how many would agree today, but maybe his words have captured our attention.

Let me just say that we are behind in giving to our local budget by at least \$20,000. These offerings pay our electricity & gas bills, insurance, furnace repair, etc. We have three months remaining to make up our shortfall.

As we plan our Christmas giving and consider how God has blessed us, maybe we can set aside a little extra for the Lord's work here in Toledo. Let's each of us pray and ask God how we should respond. —DeLaura Caulder ##

Gestures of Gratitude

In 2005, a female humpback whale became entangled in a web of crab traps and lines just east of the Farallon Islands, off the San Francisco coast. Hundreds of yards of line rope were wrapped around her body, tail, torso and mouth, weighing her down so much that she struggled to stay afloat.
